And our Vicar's reflection.....

February is approaching. From where I stand, I can watch the snow blanketing the yard. Thin blades of green and brown grass are poking through that snow blanket everywhere. The blades are short, for we are in the dead of winter and the earth is cold and stiff. If the snow keeps falling, all signs of the grass will be lost in the whiteness of the snow. It reminds me that so much of life – both the good and the bad – lies just below the surface.

Over the last month, we have witnessed all sorts of bad. Division. Distrust. Fear. Anger. Even hatred. And the resultant suffering. Most of us have been flabbergasted by what we have seen. We want to shut it down. We want to close our eyes. But somehow we can't. Every time we turn around, there is conversation – news – reminders. How are we to live with what we have witnessed? As the Psalmist prayed, "I turn my eyes to the mountains; from where will my help come?" (Psalm 121.1)

The words of the great Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel come to mind: "If a man has beheld evil, he may know that it was shown to him in order that he learn his own guilt and repent; for what is shown to him is also within him." (Here Heschel is quoting the "Baal Shem" But that's a story for another day.)

The seeds of division, of fear, of anger... the seeds of all that we have seen in our world this month... those seeds also lie deep within us. For that reason, it is a good thing that the season of Lent comes around every year. Lent is not concerned with the world around us, but with the world within. Lent invites us to take stock of the darkness within. We really would rather not. It's so much easier to bury it. As we approach Lent this year, let us commit to looking honestly below the surface of things. Let's look courageously at both the good and the bad within us. The good within is of God. The darkness within is waiting to be filled with God. As the light of God brightens within us, darkness will be driven out in us and in our world. Let's make this our individual and our communal work this Lent.
