<u>Understanding the Tenebrae</u>

A Service of Shadows

The service of Tenebrae, meaning "darkness" or "shadows," has been practiced by the church since medieval times. Once a service for the monastic community, Tenebrae later became an important part of the worship of the common folk during Holy Week. We join generations of Christians throughout the world in using the liturgy of Tenebrae.

Tenebrae is a prolonged meditation on Christ's suffering. Readings trace the story of Christ's passion, music portrays his pathos, and the power of silence and darkness suggests the drama of this momentous day. As lights are extinguished, we ponder the depth of Christ's suffering and death; we remember the cataclysmic nature of his sacrifice as we hear the overwhelming sound of the "strepitus;" and through the return of the small but persistent flame of the Christ candle at the conclusion of the service, we anticipate the joy of ultimate victory.

Opening

A single large candle and five smaller candles are lit. We begin in silence.

Officiant: Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

People: Amen

Officiant: Blessed be the name of the Lord our God,

People: who redeems us from sin and death.


Officiant: For us and for our salvation, Christ, though he was truly God, did not cling to

his power and became like one of us, a Son of Man, taking upon himself all

human limitations, even death.

People: Blessed be the name of the Lord.


Taize chant: Holy Spirit, Come to Us (3 times)



Officiant:

Holy Spirit of God, we know that Jesus took up all the burdens of our human life. Give us grace in this time to reflect on and to come to know more fully the suffering Jesus chose to endure and to truly see Jesus in his death that, following his example, we might faithfully walk the path set before us.

Taize chant: Holy Spirit Come to Us (once more)



The First Shadow

The light of faithfulness and loyalty is extinguished by the shadow of betrayal

Reader 1: Joan (Matthew 26:20-25)

When evening came, Jesus settled down with the Twelve. As they were eating, he said, "I am telling you the truth: one of you will betray me." They were extremely upset, and began to say one by one, "It isn't me, is it, Master?"

"It is the one who has dipped his hand with me in the dish," Jesus replied. "That is the one who will betray me. The son of man is on his way to his death, just as the scriptures said it would happen. But it is misery for the man who hands him over. It would be better for that man if he had never been born.

Moment of silent reflection.

Reader 2: Tom

This was not the pleasant beginning to their Passover meal they had expected. This was to be a celebration of the rescue of Israel from bondage. Yet the first words out of Jesus' mouth are filled with omens of treachery.

"Greatly distressed," as Matthew describes them, just barely covers it. How about "shocked," "incredulous," or "thunderstruck"? Each one protests – not just his innocence, but even that such betrayal could happen. And Judas protests along with them, even though he has already accepted the blood money.

They have no idea that - as they sit down to celebrate God's great deliverance of the children of Israel from Egypt - God is about to deliver them again, but this time not a single nation but all of humanity. This deliverance, like the last one, will be born in tears and struggle and death.

They do not know that Jesus will go to the cross and will respond only with love as we humans throw our very worst at him. They do not understand that this is the way Jesus will fully reveal the loving face of our God. They cannot fathom that through Jesus, God will deliver all of us from our fears and failings and even from the specter of death itself.

As the disciples gather to celebrate, they have no sense that they, like each of us, is capable of betraying, deserting, and denying Jesus. But neither do they understand God's capacity and readiness to bestow mercy, forgiveness, and redemption.

The events we ponder tonight are profoundly moving. Sometimes, though, our familiarity with a powerful story dulls our senses. Let it not be so tonight. On this night, let us tonight give our full attention to those events. In doing so, may each of us know and experience God's profound and unending love – that love which is for each or us <u>and</u> for all of us.

The light of peace is extinguished by the shadow of agony of spirit


Reader 3: Debbie (Matthew 26:36-50)

Jesus went with them to the place called Gethsemane. "You sit here," he said to the disciples, "while I go over there and pray."

Jesus took Peter and the two sons of Zebedee with him and began to be very distressed. "My soul is overwhelmed with grief," he said, "even to death. Stay here and keep watch with me." Then, going a little further on, he fell on his face and prayed. "My father," he said, "if it is possible – please, let this cup go away from me! But not what I want, but what you want."

He came back to the disciples and found them asleep. "So," he said to Peter, "couldn't you keep watch with me for a single hour? Watch and pray so that you do not fail in the time of testing. The spirit is eager, but the body is weak."

Taize chant: Stay With Me (3 times)



Again, for the second time, he went off and said, "My father, if it is not possible for this to pass unless I drink it, let your will be done." And again he came and found them asleep. Their eyes were heavy. Once more he left them and went away to pray. He prayed for the third time, using the same words once again. Then he came back to the disciples.

"You can sleep now," he said, "and have a good rest! Look, the time has come, and the son of man is given over into the hands of wicked people. Get up and let us be going. Look! Here comes the one who is going to betray me!"

While Jesus was still speaking, Judas – one of the Twelve – arrived. He had come with a large crowd carrying swords and clubs, from the chief priests and the elders of the people. The one who was intending to betray him gave them a sign: "The one I kiss – that is him! Grab hold of him!" So Judas came up at once to Jesus and said, "Greetings, Teacher!" and kissed him.

"My friend," said Jesus, "what have you come to do?" Then they came and laid hands on Jesus and arrested him.

Taize Chant: Stay with Me (3 more times)

Reader 4: Susan (Matthew 26:69-75)

Meanwhile, Peter sat outside in the courtyard. One of the servant girls came up to him and said, "You were with Jesus the Galilean too, weren't you?"


Peter denied it in front of everyone. "I don't know what you are talking about," he said.

Then Peter went out to the gateway. Another girl saw him, and said to the people who were there, "This fellow was with Jesus the Nazarene!"


Once again Peter denied it, this time swearing, "I do not know the man!"

Reader 6: Susan

(*Matthew* 27:11-17, 20-29)

So, Jesus stood in front of the governor. "Are you the king of the Jews?" the governor asked him. "If you say so," replied Jesus.

The chief priests and the elders poured out their accusations against him, but he made no answer. Then Pilate said to him, "Don't you hear all this evidence they are bringing against you?" Jesus gave him no answer, not even a word, which astonished the governor.

Now the governor had a custom. At festival time he used to release one prisoner for the crowd, whomever they chose. Just then they had a famous prisoner, called Jesus Barabbas. So, when the people were all gathered there, Pilate said to them, "Who do you want me to release for you? Jesus Barabbas or Jesus the so-called Messiah?"

The high priests and the elders persuaded the crowds to ask for Barabbas, and to have Jesus killed. So, when the governor came back to them again, they said "Barabbas!"

"So, what shall I do with Jesus the so-called Messiah?" asked Pilate. Let him be crucified!" they all said.

"Why?" asked Pilate. "What has he done wrong?" But they shouted all the louder, "Let him be crucified!"

Pilate saw that the situation was not good. In fact, a riot was brewing. He took some water and washed his hands in front of the crowd. "I am not guilty of this man's blood," he said. "It is your problem."

"Let his blood be on us!" answered the people, "And on our children!"

Then Pilate released Barabbas for them. He had Jesus flogged and handed him over to be crucified. The light of hope is extinguished by the shadow of rejection and humiliation

Reader 8: Tom (Matthew 27:31-41)

When they had finished making fun of him, they took off the cloak, dressed him in his own clothes again, and led him off to crucify him.

As they were going out, they found a man from Cyrene, called Simon. They forced him to carry Jesus' cross. When they came to the place called Golgotha, which means Skull Place, they gave him a drink of wine mixed with bitter herbs. When he tasted it, he refused to drink it.

Then they crucified him. They divided up his clothes by casting lots, and they sat down and kept watch over him there. And they placed the written charge above his head: "This is Jesus, the king of the Jews."

Then they crucified two brigands alongside him, one on his right and one on his left. The people going by shouted blasphemies at Jesus. They shook their heads at him.

"So!" they said. "You were going to destroy the Temple and built it in three days, were you? Save yourself, if you are God's son! Come down from the cross!" The chief priests, the scribes, and the elders mocked him the same way.

Reader 9: Barbara (Matthew 27:45-52a)

From noon until mid-afternoon there was darkness over the whole land. About in the middle of the afternoon, Jesus shouted out in a loud voice, "Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani!" – which means, "My God, My God, why did you abandon me?"

Some of the people who were standing there heard it and said, "This fellow is calling Elijah!" One of them ran at once and got a sponge. He filled it with vinegar, put it on a reed, and gave him a drink. The others said, "Wait a bit. Let us see if Elijah is going to come and rescue him!"

But Jesus shouted out loudly one more time, and then breathed his last breath.

At that instant, the Temple curtain was torn in two, from top to bottom. The earth shook, the rocks were split, and the tombs burst open.

Strepitus!

The Christ Candle is extinguished.

We will remain in darkness and in silent reflection for a few moments

Let us pray together:

God of life, teach us that this is the moment of both darkness and light. This is the moment in which Mary, the disciples, and all those who hoped in Jesus felt the greatest loss, even despair. Yet this is also the moment in which Jesus was freed from the restraints of his human body. Free us and all those who at this moment know darkness, that we might believe that the light of Jesus will overcome the darkest of nights. In Jesus' name, we pray. Amen!

The Seventh Shadow The burial of Jesus seems final


Reader 10: Debbie (Matthew 27:57-61)

When evening came, a rich man from Arimathea arrived. He was called Joseph, and he too was a disciple of Jesus. He went to Pilate and requested the body of Jesus. Pilate gave the order that it should be given to him.

Joseph took the body and wrapped it in a clean linen cloth. He laid it in his own new tomb, which he had carved out of the rock. Then he rolled a large stone across the doorway of the tomb and went away.
